AARES 2024 Conference Highlights

The 68th Annual AARES Conference was held at the Australian National University's Kambri precinct in Canberra. Opening remarks from the Hon Dr Andrew Leigh MP on Artificial Intelligence and economics set the scene for the conference theme, "Grand challenges at the frontier of applied economics".

This year marked a return to an in-person format for the annual conference with over 300 delegates registered for each day of the main conference. Over 150 people also participated in pre-conference workshops on a range of policy and research topics, including <u>the economic implications of Australia's net zero</u> <u>trajectory</u>, natural capital, and new software for real options analysis.

The Invited Speaker program featured keynote presentations on agricultural and environmental research and policy perspectives from Prof John Quiggin (hear <u>key</u> <u>points in a radio interview here</u>), Prof John Thwaites, Dr Pablo Juliano, Prof Jonathan Rushton (catch up with Johnathon's interview on the <u>ABC Victorian</u> <u>Country Hour</u> from 36 mins 20 sec), and from Dr Jenny Gordon, who gave the Keith Campbell Distinguished Lecture. Invited Sessions showcased work from the ACIAR, the Agricultural & Applied Economics Association (AAEA), and the European Association of Agricultural Economists (EAAE). Lunchtime sessions included a 3minute thesis competition chaired by John Rolfe, "<u>A history of AARES" by Bill</u> <u>Malcolm and David Pannell</u>, and an opportunity to meet the editors of the Australian Journal of Agricultural and Resource Economics (AJARE) was hosted by David Stern and Yu Sheng.

The 2024 conference dinner was held at the National Arboretum Village Centre, with its impressive views of Canberra. Christian Creed and Emily Dahl served as MCs for the evening, with our Immediate Past President, Frank Scrimgeour, presiding over the AARES annual awards. Live music was played by the Baker Boys band, which inspired a surprising number of attendees to dance. Thursday evening, an informal social networking event was held at The Jetty, on the shores of Lake Burley Griffin.

About the AJARE Award Winners

Two prestigious AJARE best paper awards for volume 67, published in the course of 2023 were announced at the AARES 68th Annual Conference in Canberra in early February.

The Best AJARE article award went to the paper titled 'Managing the energy trilemma of reliability, affordability and renewables: Assessing consumer demands with discrete choice experiments' published in Volume 67, Issue 2 and authored by Mark Tocock, Dugald Tinch, Darla Hatton MacDonald, and John M. Rose. In this article, the authors explore Australian household preferences for alternative electricity contracts that include investments in renewable generation, community-based energy storage, demand-side management policies, including installing smart meters, and consumption limits being imposed during peak demand. Using discrete choice experiments, the authors estimate willingness to pay and willingness to accept for these alternative contracts and find that some types of contracts have statistically larger estimates than others. This can guide policy in terms of implementation of such contracts.

The Best AJARE article by an Early Career Researcher was awarded to the paper

titled 'Logs or permits? Forestry land use decisions in an emissions trading scheme', published in Volume 67, Issue 4, authored by Dominic White (ECR) and Niven Winchester. This research uses an economy-wide model, a forestry model and land use change functions to measure the expected proportion of farmers with trees at harvesting age that will change land use from production to permanent forests in New Zealand from 2014 to 2050. Authors also estimate the impacts from conversion to permanent forest on carbon sequestration, the carbon price, gross emissions, GDP and welfare.

Highlights from the 2023 Henry Schapper Fellow Visit

In February 2024 the WA Branch of AARES was thrilled to welcome Professor Scott Swinton from Michigan State University as the recipient of the 2023 Henry Schapper



Visiting Fellowship. During his time with us in WA, Scott delivered two lectures and facilitated two engaging EMCR sessions. For the Henry Schapper Fellow Public lecture, Scott presented "Precision Conservation Agriculture: Private Costs, Environmental Benefits, Potential Policy" and got us all thinking about farmer benefits and trade-offs for converting targeted sections of farmland into in-field conservation areas. His second seminar, as part of the WA AARES ARE weekly series focused on "Measuring Farmer Risk Aversion and Its Effect on Perceived Crop Yield Distribution".

Scott's visit coincided with the AARES conference in Canberra, where he participated in a special session celebrating the connections between AARES and the North American Agricultural and Applied Economics Association, of which Scott is a past president.



We thoroughly enjoyed having Scott here in WA. While his EMCR sessions on how to convince difference audiences, including policy-makers, to listen and believe your applied economics story were undoubtably thought provoking, it was his generosity and warmth, coupled with the impromptu Friday jam session featuring guitars and singing with David Pannell on "making up the data" and being "the model of a modern ag economist", that really made his visit a delight!

About the 2023 AARES Distinguished Fellow: Gavan Dwyer

Gavan Dwyer is an Associate Director of Marsden Jacob Associates and leads its Agriculture and Resource Practice. In that role Gavan has consulted to government and industries for 10 years on a wide array of issues at national, state and regional levels. He is a sought-after



adviser to CEOs, Boards and the highest levels of Government on agriculture and resource economic issues and policy design.

Some areas of interest and focus have included dairy industry economics, RDE program design and performance, productivity analysis, water policy and social impact assessment and optimal design of biosecurity programs.

Prior to joining Marsden Jacobs, Gavan held senior positions in the Victorian Department of Primary Industries as Chief Economist and Executive Director of Policy Services and Natural Resource Policy. This had followed a long career in the Productivity Commission where Gavan led research in water and natural resources markets. About the 2023 AARES Distinguished Life Member: Terence Farrell



Dr Terence Farrell has been a member of AARES since 1988 and he has held many roles in AARES since. He served as the New England Branch Councillor from 2008 to 2015 and served as Branch President from 2005 to 2006. Terence has contributed to the organisation of AARES annual conferences, serving in three Local Organising Committees, and on the papers committee at one conference. As AARES Federal Treasurer from 2010 to 2015, Terence managed AARES' finances, with responsibilities for five AGMs and conferences. As Federal Treasurer, Terence worked to update the AARES constitution with Professor Bob Farquharson, including incorporating AARES at the national level, modernised AARES' banking and accounting systems, and worked with Professor Philip Pardey and Annie Hurst to update the AARES membership and conference management software.

Beyond Terence's critical roles within AARES, he has made significant contributions to the community through his career and public service in Australia as an agricultural economist. Terence has degrees in agricultural economics from the University of New England, the University of Saskatchewan, and Washington State University. Prior to joining GRDC, Terence worked with Grain Growers Ltd., taught agricultural economics at the University of New England, and worked in the NSW Department of Primary Industries. He has also consulted to various research organisations in Australia and overseas.

Since 2016, Terence has been the Head of Economics at the Grains Research and Development Corporation (GRDC). At the GRDC, Terence plays a vital role as an agricultural economist in support of the Australian grains industry through his responsibilities in international demand forecasting, investment analysis, and impact assessment. The GRDC invests in research, development, and extension (RD&E) to create enduring profitability for Australian grain growers. Terence's work helps ensure that science and new innovations developed in Australia help people work towards the common aim of increasing the world's food supply to meeting increasing demand.

At the GRDC, Terence helps support undergraduates with an interest in agriculture and economics through summer studentships. He has co-supervised PhD students and provided important inputs into other PhD students' work. In further support of agricultural economics in Australia, Terence has helped develop a network of economists working in RDC organisation and often shares and discusses methods of analysis.

Currently, as an active member of the ACT Branch of AARES, Dr Farrell continues to share his experience with his fellow agricultural and resource economists, including by providing advice and supporting researchers and professionals earlier in their careers.
